Document: Recognize and Respect Indigenous People's Rights

Scope: This document provides procedures to ensure the rights of indigenous peoples are respected

Responsibilities:

- The Sustainability Manager is responsible for keeping the list of Native Americans by state up-to- date.
- Regional offices are responsible for being aware of tribal land next to or near company land, and conducting appropriate interactions with local indigenous peoples

TTG is committed to recognize and respect the rights of Indigenous People. TTG will attempt to communicate with Indigenous People in order to:

- 1. Understand and respect traditional forest-related knowledge.
- 2. Identify and protect spiritually, historically, or culturally important sites.
- 3. Address the use of non-timber forest products of value to Indigenous People.
- 4. Respond to inquiries from Indigenous People.
- 5. Conduct training of its personnel on interacting with indigenous peoples.

TTG will attempt to become aware of traditional forest-related knowledge, such as known cultural heritage sites, the use of wood in traditional building and crafts, and flora that may be used in cultural practices for food, ceremonies, or medicine.

Respecting Indigenous People's Rights

- The permit process in Washington provides for local indigenous people's comments. If the local tribe notifies region personnel of the possible location of an area of interest on a company operation, the region will do its best to locate the area and notify its contractors present on the land to watch for any occurrences of native artifacts. If found, stop work in the area immediately and notify the local tribe in case they want to inspect the area.
- The notification process in Oregon provided access to local tribes to comment on proposed forest management activities.
- California -- CAL FIRE shall consult with the NAHC and listed local tribes for any THP
 and any CAL FIRE Project which has the potential to cause significant impacts to a Native
 American cultural resource. Resources of concern that require Native American
 consultation include prehistoric or ethno-historic archaeological sites, traditional cultural
 properties, such as sacred places, and gathering localities.
- Region personnel should maintain a good relationship with local tribes in the vicinity of the company's land base. Notify the local tribe if conducting harvesting or regeneration activities on company land adjacent to tribal land.
- Take the following actions if local tribes indicate interest on activities occurring on company land:
- 1. See if tribal personnel will give some indication as to the type of artifact that the tribe is interested in, and the approximate location.
- 2. Conduct a search for the artifact. Ask tribal personnel if they want to help conduct the search
- 3. Notify contractors of the possibility of native American artifacts being on the area. Have them STOP activities if they see anything suspicious. Avoid the area until it has been verified by a state archeologist or tribal representative.
- 4. Notify the local tribe if anything suspicious is found on a site, giving them the opportunity to inspect.
- 5. The state of Washington has very specific requirements in event of an incidental discovery. These requirements can be found in the protection of special sites procedure.
